The episode begins with an introduction to the beautiful town of Edda in Norway. Brothers Laurits and Magne arrive to their new home, driven by their Mother, Turid. A man in an eye-patch called Wotan is helped by Magne across the road, who's subsequently touched by a strange old lady called Wenche and thunderbolts manifest in his eyes. As Magne gets back in the car, he comments that it's going to rain and just like that — rain falls from the sky.

The next scene the brothers arrive at their new house and it's not raining. After getting settled, our brothers arrive at school where the teacher begins talking about Norse Gods and we receive a good dose of exposition about Ragnarok; the final clash between Gods and giants. It's here we're also introduced to Isolde who Magne helps, fixing her bike and befriending her as they team up with fellow student Gry for a group assignment about the local community.

The next day, Vidar arrives, meeting the boys while Magne notices the man's undead-looking dog. At home, Vidar speaks to his son Fjor and tasks him with keeping an eye on Magne.

Magne meanwhile checks out Isolde's YouTube page and it gives him inspiration to write the assignment about the government. Isolde invites him over to her house but en-route, Wenche happens to be working in Spar and tells Magne that he may be needed in the future. It turns out Isolde's father is their teacher, Eric, and she invites Magne up to the top of the mountain with her the following day. Here, she reveals she's actually a lesbian and in love with Saxa, a girl from their class.

Magne heads off alone while Vidar strips and stalks animals in the fjords nearby. As he does, Isolde heads underground and finds a strange hidden bunker with a sign on the front for Jutul Industries. This, as it turns out, is Vidar's business.

As the episode closes out, Magne bears witness to Isolde paragliding down from the mountain and landing in the electrified power-lines. As thunder booms overhead, Vidar arrives and tries in

vain to resuscitate her. That evening, Magne picks up a hammer in the pouring rain and throws it into the sky in rage as electricity surges and a blackout consumes the town.

The episode begins with an introduction to Thor and who he is before Magne tries his best to get back to normal following Isolde's death. That's easier said than done though, as the brothers return to school and find a memorial for her at her desk.

Erik arrives at school to teach but as Magne saw the incident with Isolde occur, he pulls the police officer aside and talks to her about the death, convincing her that this wasn't an accident. As we cut to Magne that evening, he pulls up

Isolde's YouTube channel and watches videos of her trying to get a comment from Vidar at his work-place, with the latter visibly annoyed at the intrusion. Enough for him to kill her? We don't have long to find out but for now, it turns out the sledgehammer Magne threw the previous night ended up straight through Vidar's car windshield, which he works out is over 1500 metres away.

While Vidar handles the sledgehammer, he admits to killing Isolde. His motive for doing so lies around hiding the bunker underground she uncovered. Quite what's inside though, remains a mystery for now. Magne meanwhile, begins to learn the true nature of his powers, throwing another sledgehammer and this time reaching over 500 meters.

At school, Magne and Gry continue to work on their assignment together. As she leaves for the evening, she invites him to her party, which he decides against. Instead he wallows in his own sadness and honours Isolde's memory while his brother Laurits arrives at the party and tries to impress the other students. Midway through a speech honouring Isolde, Magne shows up and talks to his brother, while looking longingly at Gry in the distance.

Fjor speaks to Laurits about Magne and attempts to learn more about him before interrupting his attempts to woo Gry, asking her for a dance instead. She accepts and as a romantic song starts, Magne finds himself unable to watch the two dance and runs away. Outside, he stumbles

upon a boy called Oscar and tries to convince him not to drink the water. As he tells a story about the wind changing, Magne realizes the police have changed their story around how Isolde died.

Magne talks to Eric about what he's discovered but Isolde's Father is having none of it, telling him to take it easy. Angry and frustrated, Magne heads out and moves Eric's car with his bare hands. Upon seeing this, Eric invites him back inside where he shows more of the evil corporation Vidar is in charge of and how it's destroying the world with pollution.

Meanwhile, Oscar, Fjor and Laurits head out together and ridicule the memorial left for Isolde at the scene of her death. Fjor urinates all over the tribute while Oscar snaps a video of it. Vidar learns of the incident thanks to remotely hacking Oscar's phone and promises to take care of it.

When Fjor heads home, Vidar talks to him about the old ways and how the humans used to worship them. Unfortunately his stunt causes Vidar to savagely beat his son. Only, Gry happens to be upstairs on a sleepover with Saxa and sees the entire incident play out. After Isolde's funeral the next day, Magne and the family return home to find their house completely trashed where the episode ends.

The episode begins with Magne and Laurits cornering the sketchy guy who lives nearby and asking him about the break-in. As Magne holds him up by the scruff of the neck, he mentions a shady fellow showing up with a dog — Vidar.

Following the break-in, the boys' Mum decides to redecorate while Magne tells her the police won't be able to do anything to help. After they talk, Magne gets hold of Isolde's laptop and begins investigating the water while Vidar, who is of course in charge of the factory, realizes

Magne is more trouble than he first appears.

Magne speaks to the police officer again but gets nowhere, as she simply asks him how he managed to get back to town so quickly. Meanwhile, Laurits tags along with his teenage friends and there's a slight hint of a double date going on here — as Laurits flirts with Fjor. While he does, Magne tests his running speed at school as he races through the hallways and clocks in at 6.98 seconds.

While Vidar watches on from afar, Magne is struck down by a snowplow in the middle of the road and presumes he's now dead. As the family toast to his death back home, they talk about the tunnel and how Isolde dying was a necessity. Despite Magne being hit, he actually seems to be fine and hasn't broken a single bone in his body, making him nigh on invincible. As he returns home that evening, he records his thoughts on his dictaphone again and questions whether he's invincible.

The next day Magne asks Solveig for help regarding Isolde's case and asks her about dried blood tests. She agrees to help, while at home Gry heads over to study and asks Magne about

the jacket he has. Soon after, she heads out with the other students who tease her about being a virgin and she hurries off, upset about their accusations.

That evening, Vidar speaks to Ran and questions just who or what Magne is. As a sacrificial lamb, they invite him over to their house along with his brother Laurits for dinner. After polishing off a whole plate of red meat, they continue to dance around the situation until Vidar gives Magne some mead from ancient times. Drinking out of a horn, he polishes off the whole thing and this causes him to start exhibiting some pretty ridiculous dance moves before slamming an axe into the wall. As he drops to his knees, he tells Ran that he's super strong.

She decides to put this to the test and arm wrestles with him, trying hard to prove him wrong. After utilizing his full strength, he looks up and sees an ancient, shriveled demon in Ran's place. Presumably seeing her true form he loses focus (and the subsequent arm wrestle) but excuses himself to gather his composure in the bathroom. As he looks up, he sees himself as an older man and presumably the vision of himself as Thor.

The episode begins with Magne running down the mountain and questioning just what was in the mead the family gave him that night. As he does, Vadir and the others gather and discuss the possibility that Magne is from the old world. While they talk, our protagonist tests his power as he punches a tree until it falls.

Back home, Magne eventually admits to his Mum he was drunk during his night out while Laurits plays the role of Loki and continues to wind him up. Upstairs, Magne looks up mead on his lap-

top and begins to do research on its profound effects. Unfortunately this also brings a very concerned Turid into Ran's office at school the next day where she berates her for serving her son alcohol and warns her against underestimating Magne.

Meanwhile, Magne speaks to Wenche, who happens to be working in Spar, and she tells him he's actually Thor and the family he's going up against are actually the "giants"; the big antagonists from the old world who want to destroy everything. Magne heads back to school and in class they learn about Ginnungagap during their Norse mythology lesson that further cements this conflict.

The blood test results come back and it turns out there are two sets of blood on Isolde's jacket; Isolde's and an animal. Before he can question it further however, the new girl Iman arrives and bears witness to the big debate between Saxa and Gry who discuss the pollution in the town from the factory. That evening, Magne and Gry head over to Eric's and together show him the jacket, which he shrugs off and tells them to drop the case.

While Laurits heads over to Fjor's where they prepare for their trek up the mountain, Gry and Magne climb up to the fjords where the latter finds a dead reindeer on the ground. As Magne examines it, he notices its heart missing and proceeds to head over to the other teens, who happen to be up the mountain too. Infront of the group, Magne admits his feelings for Gry,

embarrassing her. Unfortunately she rejects him and in private, tells him not to express his feelings so openly again, especially as she's fallen in love with Fjor.

Magne then speaks to Vidar about the dead reindeer and mentions the heart being ripped out. As he begins to speak Old Norse, he mentions the great battle before Magne suddenly speaks Norse back and walks away after issuing an ominous threat. Vidar sends his dog Trym after him though and as the mutt bites down on Magne's arm, our protagonist grabs its jaw and rips it clean off as blood spurts over him.

Eric walks up the mountain alone and finds a stack of rocks in Isolde's honour nearby the melting ice. Once there, he also finds one of Isolde's water samples, along with her phone hidden at their "special place."

Meanwhile, Fjor and Gry kiss and grow closer together as Vidar hurries after Trym and finds him dead, presented on a rock. Magne heads up to the cabin for help but instead finds Gry and Fjor sleeping together naked and decides against walking in. While he walks away, Gry gets up in the middle of the night and sifts through the family photo album where she finds a picture of Fjor's family from ancient times. Thankfully, Fjor is there to stop her from prying further but as she looks spooked, Magne heads home and looks set to finally confront his mum about what's been going on where the episode ends.

The episode begins with the family joining hands and chanting together while Magne heads home to tell his Mother about the monster he saw, still caked in blood following his ordeal.

The next day, police arrive and incredulously take his statement about Vidar and the yellow-eyed dog. They bring up the sledgehammer and proceed to show him an image of Tryme, telling Magne they know it was him and can't rule out the possibility he'll be taken to a juvenile centre for his actions.

Fjor talks Vidar out of killing Magne and tells the family they hold all the cards now, given they have their talons in every part of the town. This much is true with the school at least, as Ran manages to convince the police not to send Magne to prison and instead abide by a strict set of rules to follow. Reluctantly he agrees to the terms, including handing over his phone.

Saxa berates Fjor for sleeping with Gry, telling him it's against their traditions to sleep with a human. At school things continue to be awkward between Gry and Magne though as they talk about Fjor and what happened. Eric hands over the water sample he found to him, allowing Gry and Magne to work together and figure out just what's going on.

Outside at the school track field, Magne talks to Saxa about what's going on, including Fjor and Gry seeing each other. As Magne grabs her, Saxa throws him against the wall and proceeds to pierce the wall next to him with a javelin; a warning sign for him to stay out the family business.

At home, Saxa confronts Fjor and overpowers him in the living room, telling him he has to break up with Gry or there will be trouble. At school, Magne is faced with some pretty powerful people around town sitting across from him, including Eric and Ran who tell him not to write the damning school report and brush it off as "fake news". The meeting results in Magne being forced to change his assignment and needing to find a different topic to talk about.

After school, Magne heads back to Spar where Wenche tells him he doesn't have time to stand around. He rejects his calling though and walks away from her. As he does, Saxa stirs things up and tells Vidar about Fjor's relationship. Although she mentions he's going to break up with her, she actually ends up breaking off the relationship with him thanks to the environmental issues surrounding the factory.

Magne manages to break into Isolde's phone using the passcode "Saxa" and immediately checks the photos, where he sees images of the bunker buried in the ice. It's enough for him to head off alone and investigate, as he trudges through the snow looking for answers and the root cause surrounding the environmental issues in the town. As Magne opens the bunker, he switches the lights on and sees thousands of barrels full of toxic waste.

The episode begins with Magne informing the authorities about the barrels but unfortunately Vidar gets there first and moves them before they can suspect it's him. (Quite where he's moved 2000 barrels to remains a mystery but he's moved them nonetheless.) Believing Magne is lying and mentally unstable, he's suspended from school but Gry remains suspicious.

Back home, Turid berates Magne but Laurits pipes up and tells her she should focus on being a good mother instead. As

she heads to the shop to get milk, Wende tells her not to let the darkness consume her. As she begins spiraling at home, Gry flunks her exam after admitting to the examiners that her entire project was completely ironic and compares Edda to North Korea.

Magne throws all the junk food out the house and agrees to go to the doctors. While they conduct a psychiatric examination on him, Laurits gets a haircut but overhears Ran gossiping about Magne. As he spins around, he asks her for the opportunity to do a speech at the upcoming school event and she agrees to think about it.

Vidar receives a call from a man named William and negotiates with him to move the toxic barrels. Fjor overhears though and heads to Gry's house where he offers up 250,000 in money to her Father. He doesn't take it though and instead, Fjor and Gry head out together and kiss. He later visits Magne who gets his results from his doctor's appointment — medication to keep him calm — and the two confront one another.

Fjor tries to make things right and his words are enough to encourage Magne to make a stand. Unfortunately Fjor's betrayal makes him a target to the rest of the family and he drops to his knees, given one final task to prove himself — that task being to kill Gry.

Constitution Day arrives and all the students take their seats as Magne watches on, scowling at the group. However it also turns out someone has dropped some of the toxic barrels off at the police station and this causes Vidar to immediately start back-tracking. However, the officer is having none of it and reprimands him.

While Saxa sings the national anthem for the class, Fjor heads off with Gry to an abandoned warehouse. As he does, Laurits takes to the stage dressed as Ran and delivers a speech about greed and corruption. Fjor and Magne go toe to toe and although Magne overpowers him, Gry stops him from dropping the sledgehammer on his face.

Vidar shows up and starts speaking old Norse. He beats down Magne, knocking him through the walls and beats him outside until he's a bloody, bruised mess. At the last second he screams to the heavens and conjures up lightning to strike them both as Wenche watches from afar smoking and narrating that Ragnarok is simply the beginning, not the end. As rain hammers down, Magne clenches his fist and appears to wake up as the episode ends.

The episode picks up right where we left off, with Magne grabbed round the throat by Vidar who promises this is just the beginning. It's just the ominous start one would expect from this season to have, promising war in the not-too-distant future.

Magne heads straight up to the top of the cliff, where he berates Wenche circling overhead in her eagle form. Just like that, he's whisked away to a strange spiritual realm. Here, we learn outright that Magne is the chosen one. With him now

able to conjure forth and control lightning, he needs to assemble a team and find his weapon in order to fight back against the giants.

Laurits shows up at Magne's door not long after, where his brother admits that he thinks Ragnarok is starting again. He tells his brother the truth about his ancestry and the fight against giants but predictably, Laurits doesn't believe him.

In fact, this transformation continues that evening when Magne lifts his shirt to reveal intense muscles. Laurits also starts wearing make-up, culminating in the two boys heading out to pay their respects to their Father. Whilst there, they bump into Eric who agrees to let Magne come back to school for the time being.

Vidar meanwhile, heads home and gathers the family. He's concerned about Magne growing stronger and intends to stop him before he gets his hands on the ancient weapon that could defeat them. As they sit around, they wait for Fjor. Their son shows up and admits he was

unable to kill Gry. Vidar is irate but his son defies him, walking away and deciding to forge his own path.

In fact, Fjor heads back to visit Gry, deciding to stay with her after severing ties with his family. This mood only grows darker when Edda's pollution situation starts to escalate. Vidar feels the heat, prompting him to start showing Saxa the ropes at the factory. When Morten, a man from the environmental agency shows up, he immediately starts questioning what Vidar has been up to.

Elsewhere, Magne starts to learn more about Thor's Hammer, Mjolnir, and sets to work sketching out a hammer to use in this upcoming fight. Well, he's soon distracted when Wenche, still working as a cashier, passes a not-very-subtle message on to him through his Mother. She speaks of a prophecy and meeting Gods on the bridge. This immediately sees Magne rush out the house.

When he shows up, Wotan -sporting an eye-patch of course- rocks up too. He's not alone and he's accompanied by a girl called Iman, prompting Magne to bring up the fight against the giants and divulge all. This conversation however, is undercut by a heavy dose of teen angst.

Well, nothing settles the nerves more than a house party. Laurits suggests they throw it at his place and invites everyone to come over. Only, the one person he wants to show up — the random cashier from the diner earlier in the episode — is a no-show.

Anyway, at the party it soon becomes apparent who Freya is, as Iman uses her powers to make a fellow teen get her a drink while on his knees.

After the party, Iman and Magne head in to see the mechanic who overcharged Turid for the car repairs. Iman uses her powers again, forcing the mechanic to work for them and create Mjolnir. Handing over the sketch (and still under Iman's control) he promises to have it ready the following day.

Turid meanwhile, heads in to see Vidar at the factory. She confirms that 17 years back she got pregnant and it turns out Laurits is actually his child. A wry smile crosses his face as he thanks her for revealing this to him. In fact, Vidar immediately heads up and visits Laurits, hugging him outside their house while Vidar notices Magne from afar. His anger gets the better of him and he causes a blackout across Edda.

Vidar sees an opportunity, deciding to use his son as a pawn in this game of war and turning him against Magne. When Ran realizes that her husband has slept with Turid though, she's not happy. Well, there's no time to dwell

on that AS Laurits heads over to Vidar's place to play happy families.

Meanwhile, Magne meets Iman and spills the truth about Laurits to her. Iman is certainly a bad influence though, encouraging Magne to go rogue and use his powers in much the same way she is too — for selfish deeds. Thankfully, Harry -the mechanic from the previous episode — shows up with the hammer.

Magne immediately decides to test it out. With Iman by his side, the pair head up the mountainside and watch as Magne throws the hammer out of sight. Unfortunately, it fails to return to him, prompting the pair into a rather brisk hike across the mountains.

They're not the only ones up there though, as Vidar takes Laurits up to see the ancient lands and the gorgeous backdrop. He doesn't realize Vidar is grooming and manipulating him, as he happily spills details about Magne.

Back at the factory, Saxa tries to learn the ropes with the intention of proving herself to her Father. Morten and the other environmentalists have done their homework though and it doesn't look good. Calcium, lead and mercury have all been found in the drinking water. The upper-management intend on brushing it aside with a "no comment" but Saxa has other ideas.

With Vidar nowhere to be found, and Fjor spending time with Gry, it's up to her to try and change the image of Jutul Industries. In fact, she goes on the news and apologizes, promising to work closely with the authorities and get to the bottom of this. She does well to fool the public, but when Fjor hears her step up, he hurries out the diner in frustration.

Back home though, drama consumes the Vidar family. Vidar's nonchalance toward Jutul Industries is problematic enough, prompting Ran to stand up and try to lash out against him. Vidar is too strong though and he brushes aside her anger. Saxa has seen enough though and she storms out the house. In fact, she heads straight into the burger bar Magne happens to be sitting and eating in.

She finds solace in Magne and mentions how messed up her family is. Ironically, he too is going through the same thing given what's happening with Laurits. It doesn't stop her from taking his burger and biting a big chunk out of it though. Magne can only sit and watch her though, in what easily looks like awe.

With the wheels turning, Ran visits Fjor and tells him he's no longer the one in control. However, Ran believes Fjor is better suited to the role, leading to tensions in the family.

Ran tries everything to convince him later that day but Fjor refuses to play ball. In her frustration, she floors her car up the road and almost runs over Turid on her way home. Magne manages to save his Mother but Ran brushes it aside, claiming she "lost control of her car". Magne is wise to what's going on though.

In fact, Magne heads home and grabs his hammer, stuffing it in a bag and heading up to see Wenche. When she sees his cosplay attempt at Mjolnir, she scoffs at the notion of him creating this from an ordinary engineer.

She instead gives him a new mission, regarding a fire that continues to burn. She tells him to meet up on the mountain at sunrise. Only, when she disappears she doesn't actually state which one. It's a minor point but amusing given Edda is surrounded by lush mountains.

While Magne prepares for the next stage in his journey, Vidar gives Laurits his. After sacrificing a deer earlier in the day, he encourages the boy to bite into its heart. When he does, Laurits sees frightening visions of the Old Gods, including the giants.

Vidar grabs Laurits' arm, showing his powers by casting it into the fire. It heals immediately, leading one to realize Laurits is now immortal with half-God and half-Giant blood. When Ran finds out, she's livid that he didn't consult her first.

Well, when Magne heads over to see Laurits, he's unable to get through to his brother either. Vidar threatens him and forces the boy out the house. Laurits follows though and reveals that he hasn't completely betrayed Magne. He breaks the news that Ran intends to go after Wenche, prompting Magne to hurry out and try to save the Old God before it's too late.

Wenche promises the giant that she can't win, turning into an eagle and flying away. Unfortunately Ran hits her with an arrow from afar, knocking her down and into the old Gods' hideout. She pleads with Wotan to help Magne, handing over a necklace, before she crumbles and dissolves into dust in Magne's arms.

The episode begins with Magne overcome with rage and confronting Ran. He promises to kill her but Iman follows, stopping him from doing something he'll regret.

That evening Magne has another dream, this time directing his attention toward Mjolnir and making his weapon ready for the fight against the giants.

In the morning, Laurits shows off his healing powers to his brother. Magne is shocked, believing that he's "one of them" until his brother promises he's still on his

side. In order to prove his loyalty, Magne tasks Laurits with joining him to forge the hammer.

Magne believes the fire Wenche referenced before is burning inside the Jutul's house and this is what holds the key. He wants Laurits' help to break in and help make the hammer. Just in case there were any doubts over who Laurits is (there aren't), Laurits speaks to Erik about Loki's past and how he was the first trans person in history.

Meanwhile, the polluted water from Jutul Industries serves as a welcome distraction from the supernatural occurrences around Edda (which we know are caused by Magne and co.) Protestors gather outside the gates against the company as an old God suddenly resurfaces. This comes in the form of Wotan, who puts on Wenche's necklace and immediately changes his demeanor. It's now apparent that this guy is Odin.

Laurits plays both sides of the game, finding out crucial information while defying Magne and visiting Vidar behind his back. When he returns home, Laurits shows his brother the key he managed to obtain. It's just what the trickster God would do, and it plays into Magne's hands nicely.

Anyway, the pair head over that night and try to forge the hammer. Magne holds it in the fire and watches as the orange flames hungrily lick up the metal. However, Vidar's return prompts

new problems for the boys to deal with. He notices Magne in the house, who demands he hand over the hammer. Realizing they've both deceived him, he demands both teens leave.

When they head home, Mr Exposition himself (Erik) is there and he discusses stories about dark elves, Loki and the blood brothers. Erik pays specific attempt to Loki's powers, and how he is, in essence, half-Giant and half-God. This is something we've known for a while but it's reinforced here too.

Back at the care home, Magne heads over as Wotan greets the boy, calling him son and revealing himself to be Odin. Laurits is there too but Wotan tells him to leave given he's half-giant and a supposed traitor. Without much of a choice, Laurits leaves as Wotan tells Magne that his blind eye can see far and they have work to do.

There certainly is work to be done. "We don't have a Planet B" chants begin outside the gates of Jutul Industries as all our characters join in rather than actually focusing on this supposed war. Gry and Fjor are there too, along with Laurits and Magne.

Laurits is clearly starting to grow disillusioned with all of this though. Fjor steps up with a megaphone, talking passionately about his family's woes and how they need to make changes.

When Vidar leaves the factory, he picks up Laurits and they drive up to the Jutul household. Further woes befall our characters as Gry's father is rushed to hospital. He's just downed a whole bottle of pills and unfortunately he passes away.

Back at the Jutul residence, Vidar approaches Laurits with one of the old weapons, questioning his son and telling him he won't tolerate treason. Magne shows up and manages to stop him, holding the giant back long enough for the two to duel. It doesn't last long though, as Magne bests Vidar and kills him. He watches as the man's eyes turn white and he dissolves completely. Vidar is dead.

He's not going to give him the satisfaction of repenting for his actions. Laurits however, is far more open. He outright calls Magne a murderer and admits he's unable to live with him now.

Outside, Magne meets Odin, Iman and the others and reveals what he's done. The others are nonchalant about this, prompting Magne to hand over the hammer in disgust and walk away from this.

Speaking of walking away, Gry and her Mother have been talking and are due to head back to Trondheim. Laurits sports black hair and an earring, a throwback to the image he saw of himself in the mirror. He's well on his way to becoming Loki now.

Magne turns up fashionably late, making a big entrance and angering Laurits further. In fact, he leaves and sits at the front alongside Ran and Saxa.

Listening from the balcony happens to be Fjor, who listens as the vicar mentions how "The father passes the torch to the son." As a storm suddenly starts brewing outside, Fjor hears whispering about "a true son returning to battle" and it's enough to 180 his character and join the others in the congregation. As they're taking the coffin out, all the windows suddenly shatter.

Anyway, we then cut forward to after the storm as we see Gry leaving town. Magne arrives to say goodbye, admitting that he'll miss her when she's gone. Well, Fjor has second thoughts and decides to stick around instead. He believes his life is with his estranged family, showing his true face and telling Gru to leave without him. Fjor heads up to the top of the mountain and vows to destroy "them", which is in reference to Magne and the other Gods.

The episode begins with Magne joining the ranks of this ragtag group of misfits. They intend to break into Jutul Industries to forge Mjolnir in the eternal fire. They all pledge their lives to this cause, as Wotan serves as a distraction while the others hide out and prepare to take the hammer down to the basement.

As we soon find out, Laurits actually had a hand in all this. A sketchy Magne managed to convince him to hand over the key, which allows them access to the factory. The group soon figure out where

the fire is located though; a small pocket of embers burning lazily in the middle of the basement.

Iman keeps a lookout as Fjor shows up before him. The two fight while cutting to the hammer being forged. Fjor overpowers each of the different soldiers, with Mjolnir forged but missing a long hilt. Instead, this little stump will have to do, as Magne manages to slip away just as police show up on the scene.

When Magne arrives home again, he's surprised by Turid and Laurits who celebrate his birthday. Magne has obviously completely forgotten and he's put on the spot. To make matters worse, all of his merry band of misfits are either under surveillance or hurt... and the hammer doesn't work. Yay, go team?

The ongoing environmental issues continue as Morten leads the charge on TV. He informs everyone that they have enough evidence to take Jutul down, and also evidence of tax evasion too. Saxa implores her brother to hold a press conference, as he finds himself flustered.

Fjor eventually shows up and tells everyone that he's thinking about stopping production and moving everything across to Asia. It's enough of a shock to the system for the government to step

in and agree to keep things going — but under the promise that Jutul help with the clean-up operation.

Magne is furious, and it's enough for him to start conjuring up his powers back home. There's a few random scenes here, including Iman and Harry kissing because... why not I guess? And Laurits feeding his pet tapeworm; Turid also has big news. She's got a new job and Erik has invited her along for drinks.

Eventually Magne manages to control his powers again as a storm brews outside. Laurits arrives and realizes his brother lied about the key when he notices the hammer. This fulfills part of the prophecy as Magne was told he'd have to betray one close to him.

In a touch of *deja vu* to the first season, Magne heads outside and manages to conjure forth the lightning, letting it flow through Mjolnir and gaining his powers back.

At the same time, Saxa is betrayed by Ran and Fjor who knock her down and beat the girl for treason. Magne eventually shows up at their house holding Mjolnir, where he notices Saxa lying on the floor in a bloody mess.

She took the punishment that was meant for Laurits, keeping him safe. Well, Saxa decides they should team up together for this coming fight. To seal the deal they wrestle a little before **checks notes** sleeping with each other.

Anyway, Magne eventually shows up to help just in time as Fjor and Ran have Laurits on the ropes. With Ran pointing her bow and arrow at his face, Laurits promises that he has something that can destroy them all.

Magne interjects with Mjolnir, ripping it through Fjor's car and engulfing it in flames. Fjor and Ran however, manage to get away. Magne holds Laurits and reminds him he'll always be his brother.

We then skip forward to see Laurits freeing the tapeworm which is now confirmed to be Jörmungandr (or the World Serpent) and letting it loose. The intent here is to allow it to grow to the giant size it was always destined to be, ready to fight Magne in the future.

their crimes. This causes a fracture among the Fellowship of the Gods, which dissolves in anger and frustration. The Giants however continue to thrive, with Jutul Industries growing stronger and more unpredictable under Fjor's rule.

Mjolnir, tucked away on a dusty shelf and not used, calls out for Magne and with the inevitable battle on the horizon, our young Thor is on a collision course with the giants. And that's before mentioning the serpent that Laurits has been growing in secret, having made a secret deal with the Giants in season 2. He heads over to check on it, as it consumes a duck whole.

Time passes and Magne decides to use the hammer again, launching Mjolnir, which knocks off a huge chunk of bedrock down onto the power plant outside Jutul Industries. Laurits speaks to Magne after this occurs, warning that he's effectively broken the truce and war is going to come sooner rather than later. For the humans though, life goes on like normal, unaware that there's a big fight coming.

Unfortunately, she doesn't make it through the night, given Marit is killed by Fjor to prevent her from testifying. The entire scene is staged to make it look like an accident, as if changing a lightbulb is too difficult a task for an electrician.

Elsewhere, Saxa is enslaved by her family, forced on her knees and doing the bidding of her brother, who is still running Jutul Industries. Not only that, but at home Saxa has a neck brace forced on. She overhears an expansion meeting while serving drinks to her family, as Fjor continues to try and build up his father's legacy.

Fjor shows up to see Laurits that night, pointing out that his patience is running thin. With Magne now using the hammer, it jeopardizes the deal they made last time out. Laurits waves this away though, revealing that his serpent is growing.

Magne is livid and well and truly breaks the pact when he finds out about Marit. He shows up at Jutul Industries and confronts Fjor and Ran. He knocks the former down whilst holding Mjolnir, and points out that the pair have broken their pact.

Magne has had enough and reveals as much to Laurits, deciding that there's no more truce. He also figures out that Laurits is playing for the wrong side. But before going further, their parents return home. Laurits decides that he's going to leave, pointing out that his surname is now Jutul.

With his bags packed, Laurits shows up at the Jutul house and decides that he's going to move in. Ran is having none of that though, and forces him out. Unfortunately, that leaves Laurits all alone with his pet serpent.

With the battle lines now drawn, and the other Gods off around the world, Magne feels ore alone than ever before. As for his enemies, they continue to grow in power and stature, promising plenty of drama ahead.

Magne sets off alarm bells with his friends though when his intimidation with Ran causes her to given him good grades — better than he usually gets. In fact, Eric only gave him a 2 rather than a 4, and quizzes Ran over exactly what she's playing at.

Signy tries to question Magne over what's going on, but he snaps at her and chooses to keep holding onto Mjolnir's power. Ran is afraid of this, hence her jittery nature and playing along with Magne's desires. She even tells Turid that Laurits can stay with them too, in order to appease Magne.

All of this is another plan to try and win Magne over by seducing him into a false sense of security. Saxa notices this and quips that this is a better plan than the one involving Laurits and the worm, which isn't really going anywhere right now.

Saxa starts her seduction and speaks to Magne plainly at school, pointing out that all that power makes him incompatible with a human, especially one as "weak and fragile" as Signy. She also hands over the Jutul family credit card, encouraging him to pick up a brand new suit for the wedding.

When it's revealed that he has Saxa's card at the tailor, Signy is not happy. However, Magne convinces Fjor to play ball, pointing out that this is compensation for them firing his mother. This flaunting of power completely turns off Signy though, who's shocked at her boyfriend's new lust for power.

Unfortunately, all of this is going to play right into the Jutul family's hands, especially as Ran is now playing the damsel in distress and claiming that she's being threatened by a student.

At Jutul Industries, Fjor ends up having a run-in with his new assistant, Marianne. After insinuating that she's fat and overweight, he's forced into apologizing later on in the episode. He decides to drive her home too, to a nice spot by the Fjord. And we know what's inside that lake, don't we!

That night, Wotan spots Magne out with Saxa and warns him that he's playing with fire. He's wielding the most powerful weapon and he's throwing it around like a cheap pocket knife. Wotan tries to get through to him but it doesn't work, and in fact Magne flaunts his power with the old man too.

With Magne late to the wedding, it falls to Laurits to do his part and walk his mother down the aisle. Turid and Eric are right on the cusp of tying the knot... when Saxa and Magne walk in linking arms. "Sorry I'm late, little brother" he says.

Fjor continues to play the calm and collected CEO in the wake of police questioning. Marianne's death has arisen suspicions from the local law enforcement and they want to know what happened. Fjor points out that Marianne was only there for two days but she seemed stressed. He also points out that he dropped her off.

But then another backpacking group have gone missing too, which Fjor knows about as he's been feeding the serpent in secret. In fact, this satiates its appetite far better than Laurits' attempt to feed it random food. "What the hell do you want?" Laurits asks in frustration, and with that, Little O responds by spitting out a mutilated leg as an answer.

Saxa is the one who appears and grabs the hammer while the family are busy, and Ran "misses" her target, slamming an arrow through a poor 13 year old's eye instead.

Through it all, Saxa now has the hammer while Magne's plan goes up in flames. There are ravens all over the place, but Wotan gets the jump on Saxa, grabbing the hammer for himself and returning it to the group.

Iman and Harry are shocked by Magne's new behaviour and in a touch of Deja vu to episode 1, they all decide to leave... except Wotan.

Wotan points out that Magne is on a dangerous path and he needs to stick around to make sure the young man is okay. In fact, Wotan wants to help train Magne and get him ready for this fight.

Wotan leads Magne out into the woods and talks about Thor with him. In fact, he's brought to an area that was once a shrine for the God of Thunder. Magne is on edge, and he ends up killing a hare in his hastiness for bloodshed. Wotan tells him he's not ready and he needs to prepare, but Magne is way too hotheaded to listen.

When he walks away, Magne stumbles upon Saxa, who's just off in the woods for a stroll. She admits she missed him and she actually stole the hammer to give back to him. And Magne almost falls for it.

It's not the Giants he's afraid of, but actually letting down the people he cares for and loves.

Saxa shows up to see Fjor, pointing out that her pass doesn't work anymore, despite making a big show of them being joint managers now. Anyway, that's definitely not a thing anymore, and Saxa is quick to point out that they need to dispatch Magne once and for all. The only way to do that is to stick together, and she proposes a thin truce.

The family decide to do this and set out a plan to strike hard and fast. With weapons armed, they look set to leave... until Wotan and Magne arrive at the front door. They're unwilling to allow a sneak attack to take place and the Giants slump away as before.

Back home, Magne apologizes for the way he's been acting and his rash behaviour... again. He also understands why Laurits decided to give the hammer to the Giants and why his comrades doubted him. Haven't we already seen this chat like three times this season? Anyway, I digress.

Laurits suggests they use the serpent to do their bidding, but Wotan isn't sure given it's a chaos monster. As the group try to come up with a plan, Magne is the leader and he decides the options are between war and peace. He decides they need to risk everything, and that means fighting to the bitter end. Together. As a team.

Before the fight, Magne heads back to see Signy, congratulating her on her work. She's understandably cold toward him after what's happened. Magne apologizes and points out he's a complete idiot. Signy needs time to comprehend everything though.

While this is going on, Laurits gives a heartfelt goodbye to Little O, pointing out the times they've spent together and how much he cares for the serpent.

It's the final goodbye before the fight and everyone walks purposefully down the street, ready for a gang fight with the Jutuls. Given we know the police are operating in the area, we'll have to wait and see if they get involved. (News flash: they don't.) The trio of giants show down at the dockyard.

| Summary: | Despite Edda's embrace of a new dawn, the young God of Thunder cannot evade the predestined future that awaits. |



The episode starts with a new chapter beginning in Edda. With the fighting ending with a peace treaty and everyone throwing down their weapons, Edda is a peaceful, mellow and easygoing community again. As for Magne, he puts the hammer aside and decides to prepare for his exams. But what of the God of Thunder when the battle is done and there's nothing left to fight?

Iman and Harry both return to their old lives they left behind, no longer needed in Edda, while Saxa still hasn't

messaged Magne back. Fjor is also shackled up with his colleague from work too. Jutul Industries turns a corner, polluting less as Saxa works with the investors and the activists to make a better world going forward.

Magne passes his exams and is congratulated by Turid. As for Signy, she's had an article published in the paper and she's super happy. She grins from afar... and walks right past Magne to celebrate with the teacher.

While Magne graduates, Laurits prepares to move out with Jens and they get ready to start a new life together. Now that Little O has presumably swum away and gone, it leaves the house surprisingly empty. Magne goes through old belongings though and ends up finding a whole bunch of Thor comics and a toy Mjolnir. Naturally, he ends up reading through the comics, reminiscing on old times.

The graduation ceremony at school goes ahead, and Signy is still not really talking to Magne. She still needs time, so he takes his seat along with everyone else and listens as Ran does her big speech. Magne is distracted though, especially as he notices Harry outside teaching the different kids.

The trouble is, one if these happens to be Hod, the kid who took an arrow to the eye during the skirmish in the streets. Now, at this point it's worth pointing out that for the rest of the episode, there's a good deal of fiction and narrative misdirection going on. We'll explain what happens after laying out the visual recap of events.

Hod takes the bow and arrow, and Magne watches as he realizes this is eerily similar to his own experiences reading the Young Thor comic. And guess what its name is? The Death of Baldur. And who is Baldur? Yep, it's Jens.

Magne calls out in shock, just as Jens takes an arrow through the heart. The Prophecy looks like it's about to unfold, led by Laurits himself while blinded by rage and anger... only everyone keeps clapping at the ceremony. No one seems to realize what's happened.

It turns out Magne is imagining these different scenarios play out, allowing his mental self (the one harnessing Mjolnir and Thor's powers) to play out what would happen should Edda be consumed by Ragnarok.

After a whole sequence of one on one fights, with the three giants and Laurits working to dispatch the various Gods and fight to the bitter end, Magne is left alone in the school auditorium after the ceremony. Signy shows up and admits that love is the most dangerous emotion and she wants Magne to do his best. If he can promise to do that and be there for her, then she'll agree to be his girlfriend.

Magne takes nine steps toward her and drops to his knees, which is prophesised by the legend of Thor which sees him poisoned by the Serpent after besting the beast. We actually see this happen during the visions too. Anyway, this would then lead to Thor's death only for him to be reborn in the New World. Alas, the New World being Edda.

Magne drops to his knees and holds out his hands for Signy, allowing himself to move past Ragnarok and the impending threat to something better — a new beginning.

In the wake of this, Magne decides to throw away all of his old Thor comics and move forward with his life, and heads back to see his friends. He's greeted by Signy, who embraces him warmly and he takes his seat alongside everyone else. There's a shot of Isolde sitting in one of the seats before fading, hinting that Magne is still haunted by her memories, but is moving past that.
