Summary: Gamache ignores his superior's orders and investigates the disappearance of Blue Two-Rivers. As punishment, he's dispatched to the remote village of Three Pines to solve the murder of a wealthy socialite with no shortage of suspects.



The episode starts with a whole bunch of protestors demanding justice for their loved ones going missing. They claim the SQ are doing nothing to help, and show up in their numbers at the police station. As things begin escalating, Inspector Armand Gamache heads outside to calm things down.

Blue Two-Rivers is one of the girls and she's been missing for over a year (13 months and 11 days to be precise). No one has taken the case on and apparently this originated when she stepped into a car. Peacekeepers asked SQ for help 9 months ago and since then they've heard nothing. Blue was only 18 as well and there's no way she'd just up and leave,

at least according to her mother, Missy. After driving the family home, Gamache promises to try and find the young girl.

That night, during a Christmas party, Gamache speaks to Pierre Arnot, a colleague who happens to be running the division overseeing the Two-Rivers case. They couldn't find anything

out the ordinary and believe that Blue and her boyfriend Tommy took a ride out in a truck and left town. Since then, they haven't been seen again. Pierre warns that Gamache is going to obsess over this case and it's going to break his heart, knowing what how obsessive the inspector can get.

Although it looks beautiful on the surface, beneath the surface of Quebec village Three Pines, there's a lot of secrets and grudges. This much is especially true during a choir performance at a church, as numerous dirty looks are thrown at CC, a woman who's having an affair on her husband Richard. She regrets having her daughter Crie and calls out Richard (in French) as a bad husband.

CC is not well liked in the community, with some clearly likening her to a modern day Cruella De Vil (and not the Disneyfied "This puppy murderer is just misunderstood" way).

CC is having an affair with her close colleague and photographer Saul Petrov. She also shuts down Clara Morrow, a promising painter who wants to show Petrov her portfolio but CC rudely blows her off completely.

The community has a big curling match going on, explaining why they're all gathered together, but tellingly CC sits separately to everyone else. She starts to feel hot, taking off her gloves and attempts to stand up. As she does, CC touches the arms of her metal chair and ends up electrocuted.

Inspector Gamache is called to the scene, along with several other investigators. Apparently no one saw anything awry, but whoever did this must have been meticulous and bold. To electrocute someone in front of the whole village, and to do so in this manner means they must be intelligent.

Investigating the crime scene, Gamache deduces that whoever the killer is used jumper cables with a generator to electrocute CC intentionally. But why do this so publicly and elaborately in front of everyone?

CC's next of kin is her husband Richard Lyon and his daughter, Crie. Gamache speaks to Richard in confidence, who tentatively admits that she and Saul spent a lot of time together. He's a portrait photographer and was also helping with her new book.

That night, Inspector Gamache and his team head to the local bistro, where the entire village are together joyously laughing and eating on one big table. Gamache notices a beautiful painting up on the wall and learns that Clara painted it. After a brief chat with her, and Clara's partner (Peter) who doesn't seem best pleased that Clara is still an undiscovered talent, it's down to brass tacks — dinner.

Gamache's team includes the local rookie, Yvette Nichol, second-in-command Jean-Guy and Isabelle. *Be Calm* (the name of CC's book) also happens to be the name of the community center up in town. While setting up their base of operations there, Yvette gets working on the list of credit card transactions and all those hotel rooms CC ended up paying for.

As for Isabelle, she looks into how all of this is connected. Washer fluid was found under CC's seat at the Curling match, and she was wearing metal clawed boots too, essentially turning her seat into an electric chair. An electric chair execution that the whole village witnessed.

In the morning, Gamache speaks to Saul Petrov, who has a rather flaky story and it doesn't help that his hand shakes while putting his USB stick in the drive. Gamache warns him not to leave Three Pines for the time being.

Gamache and Jean-Guy do the preliminary reports for various different residents in town, including the eccentric writer Ruth Zardo who really doesn't seem all that bothered about CC's death. And in fact, Gamache shows up and speaks to all the residents at their book club, pointing out their grievances with the deceased and how CC ruffled their feathers (no pun intended, given Ruth is cradling a duck).

That night, Pierre rings with an update on the Blue Two-Rivers case. Tracing the registration plates and social media feeds, they find a picture of Blue and Tommy together under the Red Rook hashtag. It was posted two weeks ago. Isabelle joins Gamache as they head to the Blue Rivers residence to let them know the good news. Only... something isn't right.

Despite the picture being posted a few weeks back, it would appear that Blue's jacket is actually still hanging in the closet. In the morning, Gamache heads back to the Community Center, where he works out just how many suspects there actually are. It's the whole village. So how on earth are they going to whittle down the list? An what if it was really all of them together that's responsible?

Summary: Gamache looks into the victim's enigmatic past and learns one of the villagers withheld information. Gamache's delight at a breakthrough in the Blue Two-Rivers case is short-lived when the family has doubts, leading to a desperate act.



The episode begins with CC taking a pillow and murdering an old lady in her bed. A creak from the doorway seems to hint that someone ended up watching this take place.

Fast forward to the present, and two days have passed since CC's murder. With all the villagers together, Gamache organizes everyone to sit exactly where they did during the Curling match. Gamache tries to work out how the electrics play into this, and it could well be Richard Lyons. He has a number of patents for electrical inventions. Given he knows how electric circuits work, he could have devised this electric chair himself.

While Nichols run a background check on Lyon's finances, Gamache ends up speaking to Bea about CC's book, learning that some of the words are from the Bible but a couple of words have been changed. Furthermore, CC seems to have built a whole philosophy around a Christmas ornament, potentially the same one that we saw Crie smash last episode.

According to the coroner's report, CC's blood had 20 times the normal dose of niacin. A high enough dose can actually promote hot flushes, explaining why she took off her gloves. This would denote that her drink was spiked at the Curling match. Even more bizarre though, there's no birth certificate in the name of Cecilia de Poitiers. It's almost as if CC doesn't exist. If that wasn't enough, CC also lied about her parents' names too.

Jean-Guy comes bursting in though with Saul, who was on the verge of destroying crucial evidence before being tackled to the ground. Once together, Gamache and his team find dozens of photos of Saul and CC together, along with numerous pictures from the Curling match. There's also one of Richard Lyon getting CC her coffee.

CC's real mother apparently made her life hell, but Saul points out he and CC had just broken up, right on the edge of this Curling match. After the interview, Gamache rules out Saul as the killer. He's too in love with her and doesn't really have a motive. Richard though, most certainly does. He was in financial dire straits and leaking money. CC was insured for close to a million so with her now dead, it actually sorts their family finances out completely — and puts Richard Lyon in the spotlight.

Gamache immediately goes on the offensive and confronts Richard Lyon with Jean-Guy. He points out that CC became a bully who liked causing pain and he's glad she's gone... but he didn't kill her. He's adamant that murder wasn't on the cards and given he didn't even know what CC's real name was either, it seems to add up.

As we soon find out, CC's real name was Cecilia Longpre, which seems to hint that her mother's name is Emilie Longpre. The same Emilie Longpre we caught glimpses of last episode.

When Gamache dives deeper into this, it turns out the lady is actually CC's aunt. CC's mother was called Eleanor. El was always troubled and it deepened her depression, having a breakdown and even striking CC as a child. El died in a shelter in Montreal about a year back. Apparently they couldn't find a cause of death, but it seems this is the scene we saw at the start of the episode.

Gamache is clever and figures out the meaning of this "Be Calm" statement that's been repeated throughout the past couple of episodes. It's actually a combination of four names. Bea, Kaye, El and Em. They adapted a psalm, meaning that they weren't strangers after all. They must have been super close to come up with all of that. "Don't leave the village will you, Bea." The Inspector finishes.

In the morning, Gamache shows up at Emilie's place where she has video footage of her confessing to the crime and doing so to save Crie from CC as she's a monster. While Jean-Guy puts the evidence in lock-up, Gamache hurries over to try and find Em. Only, she's out in the freezing cold, almost dying of hypothermia.

As a result of this, Gamache doubts Emilie's story, and even more so when he realizes that whoever did this must have known about the metal claws on the boots. This denotes someone super close to CC, which rules out Emilie. It could well be that Emilie is covering for the real killer who may have confessed everything to her.

Gamache shows up at Richard Lyon's place and speaks to Crie. He susses out that she's the one responsible given she learned what she knew from Richard. It also turns out that Crie was the one who witnessed CC killing her mother in the past, and conspired with her to cover everything up. Police take her away and arrest the girl.

As for this Blue situation, apparently a small time drug dealer claims to have sold meth to Tommy two days ago. And Blue was with him. Blue's mother Missy is convinced that the police haven't done enough to help her daughter. She waits outside the police station all night, but when Gamache shows up, she's standing on the edge of the roof. He hurries up to try and stop her but it's too late. She jumps. Gamache is shocked and helpless.

Summary: Gamache returns to Three Pines to investigate the disappearance of the popular resident Marc Fortier but it soon becomes a murder case that leads Gamache and his team into the heart of the village's dark past at St Anthony's. Meanwhile, Lacoste discovers a key piece of evidence relating to Blue's disappearance has been faked, and with Gamache's encouragement secretly reopens the case.



The episode starts with a little bit of late-night arson. The locals head to CC's old home to set the place on fire. They start to pour gasoline into the bushes and enter the building. They soon hear voices and find teens partying in the abandoned home. The locals scare off the teens, and they decide to check all the rooms before starting the fire properly. Marc Fortier heads into the basement, where a hooded figure kicks him down the stairs. Another day at Three Pines, another death.

Armand and his faithful colleagues are quick on the scene. There are no signs of a struggle and no unique pieces of evidence to over-analyze. But Armand finds the gang a clue almost immediately. He

spots fingerprints in the dust and swiftly uncovers a hidden door that leads to a hidden room. CC's home was an old school for indigenous students, and this particular room was used to lock in and torture students. Armand finds Marc's bloodied corpse in another compartment within this room. The victim's head was bashed in with a rock, which is placed beside the body. As they leave, they sniff the gasoline in the bushes, Armand has two crimes to solve now, both occurring within minutes of each other.

Marc had no relatives, so they go to question his closest friend, Hayden, and his daughter Sophie. Marc and Hayden were friends since college and both helped each other out in their time of need. Both lost their wives and at the time of Marc's death, he was living with Hayden and Sophie. Hayden believes Marc had no enemies and was a well-liked individual. The authorities find alcohol in Sophie's room and a photo album that reveals a link between Marc and the old school — Marc's father was the caretaker there.

Isabelle investigates Blue's case further and discovers a piece of key information that all the other officers missed. Blue was photographed at a party, yet this was clearly photo-shopped. She was never at that event, but somebody wanted it to look like she was. Isabelle goes to tell the family the news. She apologizes for their loss, Missy committed suicide at the end of the previous episode. Isabelle is suspicious of Kevin and inspects his house next.

All the locals are interviewed once again. They deny any involvement in the murder or the attempted arson. It is revealed that CC's house was going to be bought and turned into a hotel, which could be seen as competition for the Bistro owners, thus a possible motive for burning the place down. The owners talk of the building being haunted and a ghostly caretaker roaming the halls. Armand realizes that Marc's father was the caretaker.

Jean-Guy and Armand are invited to dinner at the Morrow's, but the invitation isn't just a harmless gesture, they have ulterior motives, and they want info on Marc's death. Ruth blurts out the question as soon as Armand has sat in his chair. They want to know how he died. Armand tries to change the topic of the conversation and asks for details on Marc's life. He was an amateur painter and a psychotherapist. The locals bring up the haunting again and an argument erupts. Bea is extremely defensive about the predicament and states that grown men tortured children in that place, it is no laughing matter. Is Bea now a possible suspect?

Further digging reveals that the caretaker was the main abuser at the school and his son, Marc, wanted to make amends for all that suffering. He proposed a memorial for the survivors and Bea opposed it. Bea's tattoo matches the symbols found in the torture chamber. Armand questions her and she confesses, she was locked in that room for two days straight as a child. There is a lot of bad energy and many disturbing memories intertwined with that place. She hated Marc for two main reasons, firstly his connection to the torture and secondly his misguided publicity stunt.

Jean-Guy thinks Sophie or the Morrow family are more likely suspects than Bea. Then Yvette finds hidden keys that belonged to Marc and a goose key ring connected to the chain. They pay Ruth a visit. She was renting out her cabin to Marc so that he could do his paintings in private. They rush over to the cabin, in the dead of night. Jean-Guy notices that the place has been inhabited lately, then they hear a noise. A chase ensues and they manage to force the intruder into a dead end, the mysterious figure is revealed to be Peter Morrow — our latest suspect.

Summary:	The villagers confront the truth of their past and exorcise their collective demons as Gamache makes a breakthrough in the murder case and realises Marc's killer had a very personal motive. Meanwhile, Lacoste makes a discovery relating to Blue's disappearance that seems to identify a key suspect.



The old school, St. Anthony's, is intricately linked to the history of Three Pines, a place where indigenous students were tortured and kept prisoners for years. The episode opens with a flashback, showing the horrors of this awful place. A young Bea watches as her brother and two other young students leave for brighter futures, while the evil caretaker apprehends poor Bea. In the previous chapter, we found out who the caretaker was and how Bea was linked to it all but is she just a distraction, a red herring if you will?

Armand thinks it's all connected, the murders and the school. He interrogates Peter Morrow, who they arrested in the previous (literal) cliffhanger. The police have uncovered his deleted phone conversations with Marc, it seems they had an intense relationship that verged on a romance. Peter says they didn't have an affair though, Marc was just his therapist. He traded painting lessons for therapy sessions. Peter went to the cabin to find Marc's laptop to delete the therapy notes. Another local with secrets they want to keep hidden.

Isabelle manically checks Tommy and Kevin's house again and this time she finds some evidence. There are huge chunks missing from the rug and underneath, the floorboards appear to have been tampered with. Later, forensics uncover bleached floorboards and Blue's blood. The missing person case continues to build some momentum adjacent to this week's murder mystery. Meanwhile, Isabelle receives a visit from Youth Protection. A complaint has been made about Isabelle's parenting and they must follow it up appropriately.

Yvette looks into the teenager's cell phone that they found at the murder site. She discovers incriminating video footage. Firstly, it shows Sophie at the building, drunk and joining in with the vandalism. Secondly, it shows Bea in attendance on the night of Marc's death, something she previously lied about. Armand confronts her about this, but Bea is antagonistic as always.

Jean-Guy researches the school and finds out about the story from the opening scene, Bea's brother ran away from home but drowned. He also points out an intriguing name on the school's register — Mary Two-Rivers, she is now known as Arisawe. She was a pupil at St. Anthony's — our first major link between the two stories. Jean-Guy and Isabelle stake out the building that night and hear strange noises inside. On investigating these spooky sounds, they find a raccoon in the basement, this leads to the uncovering of a secret passageway that takes them to another room in the house. They assume the killer used this hidden crawlspace to escape unseen. In the tunnel, Isabelle finds a mobile phone.

Armand and Isabelle visit the Two-River's household, to ask about the school's history. Kara admits to phoning the child helpline, she was the one who set up Isabelle out of anger and for some of her own revenge. Then Arisawe talks about the night her brother escaped. She believes the caretaker killed him and the other boys. Armand takes a shovel and gets to digging. He soon finds human bones in the torture chamber, she was right all along.

Bea is informed of this bittersweet finding. She can now put her brother to rest. Bea blames herself for his death, she was the one that got caught. All the signs point towards Bea being the killer, but she denies killing Marc again. Bea directs Armand's attention back to Hayden, who was arguing on the day of Marc's death. This inter-cuts with Hayden and Sophie arguing in the present. Hayden knew about Sophie's teenage rebellion and admits that he lied to the police for her. Sophie just wants her space and storms off.

Armand's team start to deliver on the more pressing evidence. Jean-Guy says that Marc wasn't broke, but he was deceiving Hayden. Marc bought a plane ticket to New York in Sophie's name. And then Yvette finds the voice notes between Marc and Sophie. He was trying to help her escape her father's controlling stranglehold. They race to Hayden's house, but there's no one home.

Hayden drives Sophie to an unknown destination. The police tail him and he refuses to pull over. The only thing that stops him is a ridiculous altercation with a bear. Hayden and Sophie's argument is cut short when he suddenly brakes in front of this deadly animal. The police coax Sophie and Hayden out of the car and Hayden is arrested. He confesses immediately, stating that he was only protecting his daughter, it was just an accident. But Armand isn't being fooled. Hayden is the killer. In the final moments of the episode, Armand is informed that there is an incident at the school, and someone has finally burnt the place down. Bea looks on with a smirk on her face. Did the locals finally get their way?

Meanwhile, Lacoste receives a surprise call which blows the Blue Two-Rivers case wide open.



The Morrow family has gathered at the family Chateau, which is now a lucrative hotel business, to hear the last will and testament of Charles Morrow, the ruthless businessman and father. His children, Thomas, Peter, and Mariana are each left twenty thousand and his wife Irene gets the estate. But it is the estranged daughter Julia that gets the Chateau. This announcement is met with anger from the rest of the family. They are then shown the father's final gift, an unsightly statue of the man himself.

That night they gather once more for a meal to discuss their father, and married couple Peter and Clara bump into Armand and his wife Reine-Marie. They are

staying at the Chateau for their anniversary — what a coincidence. Armand watches the Morrow family meal from afar. It's a heated debate as they argue. Julia believes she was owed the hotel as a reward for something horrible her father did to her in her youth. She argues that no one

stood up for her at the time, but she has now found her son and is going to give him the hotel instead.

A violent storm follows that aggressive meal and a drunk Julia wanders the rooftop in the torrential downpour. She goes to her father's statue, where she releases more of her pent-up anger. While Julia goes wild, Armand is having a rather painful dream. The next morning, he walks the grounds with his wife but is swiftly summoned. There's been a terrible accident. Julia is found crushed underneath the statue.

Jean-Guy and Isabelle are quickly requested and investigate the crime scene with Armand. The Chief thinks this is no accident, Julia was bludgeoned to death before the statue was pushed onto her. This was staged to look like an accident, but it is very much a homicide. Armand orders all guests to be contained within the grounds for questioning. He notices that the cement hasn't hardened on the statue's feet and there are strange carvings all over the monument. There's even excrement smeared on the statue too.

Armand informs the Morrow family and the hotel staff of Julia's passing. They all deny seeing Julia after the meal. As usual, the gang starts to gather evidence and question all the suspects. Charles' wife Irene explains how Julia became pregnant at fifteen and Charles ordered her to put the baby up for adoption. Irene wasn't included in the discussion and is saddened to this day by the incident. Julia soon left the family, which created a rift between all the siblings.

Peter, who has been a suspect of Armand's before, is seen on the CCTV footage wandering the grounds during the storm. Peter admits to looking for Julia, even though he lied about this earlier to Armand. Julia and Peter had argued the night before, but he promises he didn't kill his sister — well, that's that then. Armand shows Peter the carvings. Peter notices a carving of a dog that looks like a drawing he did as a child. Peter explains how Charles would set the children puzzles to solve, in an attempt to test and humiliate them. He thinks these carvings are Charles' final puzzle. Each sibling represents a different carving.

Isabelle and Yvette check Julia's room, where they find two wine glasses — suspicious! Yvette is flippant about Julia's death and asks what she had done for a job. Isabelle informs her that she was a tech entrepreneur. Isabelle is tired of Yvette's unprofessional antics, and I am growing ever more irritated by this character too. She asks Yvette to go fetch some drinks, just to be away from her. Then Isabelle discovers a note written to Julia, it says: "Meet me by the statue, we need to talk".

There's another break in the Blue Two-Rivers disappearance case. Suspect Kevin Kis sees his details on the news and panics, calling Isabelle. He asks to meet with her alone to prove his innocence and explain what really happened.

Armand interrogates Clara, who reveals her husband's history with Julia. When she fell pregnant, Julia confided in Peter and told him she was going to elope with her boyfriend. He went and told his father, leaving the baby scan photo on his desk. Julia never forgave him for this betrayal and Peter never forgave himself either. Once again, Peter is a suspect in a Three Pines murder case.

Summary: Gamache and his team get to the heart of the case, excavating decades-old resentments and deeply buried secrets in the Morrow family as they do so, and make the key discovery that enables them to identify the killer. Meanwhile, Lacoste's elation at making a breakthrough in the Two-Rivers case proves short-lived and a tragedy leaves her shell-shocked.



Picking up from where we left off, Armand talks Thomas out of a painful death. As he persuades Thomas to lower the rifle, the eldest of Charles' siblings apologizes to his father, admitting that he didn't kill the stag all those years ago. He seems to have reverted back to a child and throws a tantrum inside the hotel. Armand is fully aware that Thomas lied about his alibi, which makes him the main suspect. Even his wife, Sandra, is suspicious of her own partner. To prove his innocence, the police take Thomas' phone, he states that he was calling his creditors when Julia was killed.

Isabelle meets with Kevin Kis. The paranoid fugitive points a gun at the cop, but she manages to calm him down. He tells her that he, Blue, and Tommy were pulled over by the police. Kevin knew he'd be locked away, so he ran. In the nearby forest, he heard gunshots, and on returning, they were all gone. Kevin believes that Blue and Tommy's disappearance is

actually a police cover-up for murder. This puts Kevin in a tricky position, and he struggles to trust anyone on the force. Isabelle asks to speak with Armand, but Kevin is spooked and runs. Even Isabelle is paranoid after this twist, anxiously researching the incident at work.

Thomas and Sandra argue in soap opera-styled, melodramatic fashion. She thought he was having an affair, but he's just about to declare bankruptcy instead. Phone records prove that Thomas was telling the truth and the odd couple seems happy once again. Peter walks in on Thomas' celebrations, angered by his brother's selfish attitude. These two siblings then argue. Peter steals his cuff-links and the two fight out on the lawn. It's another odd sequence that is supposed to be played for comedy (I think), whilst highlighting the sibling rivalry and their immaturity.

Armand reassesses the carvings, realizing that there are four children, but five carvings. They discover that Charles kept altering his will and at one time considered a fifth inheritor, but this was eventually dropped. To Armand this is a fresh lead, there is a fifth member in this tale, who could possibly be the murderer. Discussing the fifth inheritor, Sandra reveals that Charles was having multiple affairs, it could be anyone. Then Peter and Thomas make amends.

Jean-Guy suspects hotel worker Elliot and rushes to his on-site bedroom. He breaks in and finds plenty of incriminating evidence. There's a piece of paper that proves Elliot was forging Thomas' handwriting, to later frame him with that letter. Elliot had another identity, and then the murder weapon itself, a bloodied shovel, is found hidden in his wardrobe. Maurice discovers that Elliot has stolen money as well. He's clearly on the run. The police panic, but Yvette is to the rescue, arresting the man as he flees. Elliot confesses to being on the run as a fugitive but believes he's been framed for the murder.

As usual, Armand cracks the case. He continually refers back to a family photo that featured the killing of the stag. He ponders who took the photo and goes to interrogate Maurice, the hotel manager. Maurice bolts and tries to escape, grabbing a knife from the kitchen. All the exits are blocked by the police though, so he takes Bean (Charles' granddaughter) hostage instead, with a knife to her throat. This gets everyone's attention and the whole cast surround the killer, unable to help.

Maurice reveals that Charles was his father, he was in fact the eldest son. Charles had an affair with Maurice's mother and broke her heart. He chose the Morrow family over her and Maurice. Charles promised to give Maurice the hotel when he died but then went back on his promise. He worked for the man his entire life and was left with nothing in the will. Armand realizes that it was Maurice who shot the stag, not Thomas or Julia.

Meanwhile, Gamache's investigation into Blue's disappearance leads to a terrible discovery that turns Gamache's world upside down.



The episode starts with a man named Ellis coming crashing into the Bistro in Three Pines, telling them all that he knows what they've done and that they're all "going to pay for this." Although he's taken out by force, those inside happen to be our usual rabble of suspects we've seen across the season and they cast a concerned glance at one another.

Meanwhile, the search for Blue continues, with the community scouring the forest to try and find clues. Off the edge of Pine Ridge, the group end up finding a hanged man — Ellis as it turns out. Al-

though it initially looks like suicide, several sets of footprints seem to debunk that theory.

When Gamache shows up, he notices the man's hands don't look like that of a climber's, and he has white pine tree needles on him too. Bea confirms there's only a handful of places those pine needles can be found in the woods.

The general theory here is that a group worked together to hang Ellis. When Clara Morrow shows up, she confirms the man was at the Bistro the night before and he "did some damage." He had to be restrained and taken outside by force and was staying at the town's B&B.

Gamache and the team arrive at the Bed and Breakfast, exchanging pleasantries with Ruth (well, she tells him to fuck off which is basically her way of saying hello). The man paid cash and

had no guests the whole visit. The team are able to check out his room too, where everything seems to be in order. At least upon first inspection.

The bag he has only has enough for 3 days not a week, while there's no phone or wallet either. A letter on the bed reads like a suicide note but the handwriting is way too neat and it seems like it has been staged.

Ellis' anger appears to be aimed at no one in particular but Olivier — one of the men there — shows and is tasked with pointing out exactly who was at the Bistro that night. The Chief Inspector appears first and speaks to Gabri Dubeau, the waiter, who happens to have been punched in the mouth. He doesn't reveal much, but a conversation between Olivier and Gabri in French says more, specifically how the pair ended up having a big fight that night.

Interwoven around this case is the situation involving Blue. Kevin is the prime suspect here, despite being dead, while Gamache does some research into the police involved with the Blue case. It would seem that there's a trigger-happy officer that could be at the heart of this.

The next day, Gamache and Isabelle end up finding two bodies buried in the woods. Blue and Tommy. Not only that, but Gamache also finds more bullets at the scene of the crime. They're police-issue too.

Blue appears to have been running away from cops, and whoever this officer is, shot her and also shot Tommy. It's a heartbreaking revelation, especially for the family, and something that doesn't go down well.

Meanwhile, the group learn that Ellis had a rental car and his suicide note is actually his handwriting too. But how did he write under so much duress? One of the more crucial clues here comes from the residents themselves, with Clara and Myrna rushing up to the Inspector in town with big news. The Book Club are actually reading *The Handman* the next month.

Ellis is just a pseudonym, it would seem, as his family have a long history of being on the tougher end of the law. More specifically, Ellis happened to be Canada's most prolific executioner. He had over 600 people hanged. Their family had been hanging people for over 300 years. It seems this Ellis character is very much along the same lines, and could have been using this name intentionally to try and get revenge ("casting vengeance") to those who have wronged him.

Soon, Isabelle learns the man was actually called James Hill. He packed up his whole apartment, he had a family but seemed to have been living alone. The suicide note could be genuine but he may have been killed before he actually did it himself.

Anyway, Gamache is en-route to the city, intent on closing out this Blue Two-Rivers case once and for all. With ballistic records done under the table, to avoid suspicion, the markings are traced back to two different guns. Their names and badge numbers are in the report and neither gun was reported as lost. Daniel Chowski is the first name. And the second? Pierre Arnot. Oh no.

Summary: Gamache and his team unearth a tragic story that provides the key to the victim's desire for vengeance, and by doing so leads the team to his murderers. Meanwhile, it falls to Gamache to apprehend the individual responsible for Blue Two-Rivers' disappearance, putting himself in grave danger as he does so.



The episode starts with a look at Gamache's past. Specifically when his parents were killed in a car crash. Gamache survived, and it's something that's haunted him ever since. Still, we're back in the present for now and Gamache deliberates over how to handle the ballistic report. Knowing that Pierre was the one who shot Blue — and he happens to be over playing cards with the family that night no less — makes things suitably awkward.

With Kevin dead and the case turned to that of a homicide, Gamache brings up

the white pine needles and a parable that claims that appearances can be deceiving. As he stares daggers through Pierre, his wife picks up on the signals and Gamache reveals the truth to her in confidence.

Gamache shows up to see the Superintendent in the morning, informing him of Pierre Arnot's involvement in the case and what happened. The man agrees to hand it over to internal investigations and get right on resolving the matter urgently.

Back in Three Pines, Gamache is determined to resolve this case as quickly as possible. A returning Jean-Guy joins Isabelle and our protagonist as they deep dive into the history of the residents, intending to find out what the connection to James Hill happens to be.

It seems that James Hill came to Three Pines after a big accident that occurred on the road. There's no conviction for the driver though, while Hill worked to try and get justice for five years. When he couldn't, he moved to Ottawa, taking a job in the records office. He believes that one of the kids is actually in Three Pines, explaining what Hill was doing there, wanting to cast vengeance. Of course, this whole ordeal is too much for Gamache to take, given his own history and past involving car crashes.

Jean-Guy deduces that Hill's plan was to find and kill each of the four kids from that fateful day at the crash. However, whoever these kids are they got to Hill first and hanged him to cover their own backs.

After doing solid police work, Gamache orders Jean-Guy to head home and surprise Enid. The thing is, he and Enid are actually breaking up. Speaking of surprises, Agent Nichols overhears a couple of officers talking about how Pierre isn't the one being arrested. It's Gamache. She's shocked and hurries out without being seen, intent on tipping off our inspector.

Meanwhile, an unknowing Gamache heads back to the Bistro again, where he speaks to Olivier about the fight that occurred that night between James and Gabri. Now, a witness actually puts Gabri running out of the forest around the time of the murder, which doesn't look good. He claims he went for a run, but Gamache brings up Gabri's shaky alibi, including how he happened to have Hill's wallet in his pocket. According to Gabri, Hill intended to give it back when he left it in the bistro but when Hill came in, kicking and screaming, it slipped his mind.

Gabri knows who the kids are in town and eventually reveals as much to Gamache. It's Angela and Mike Blake. Gabri is in the clear, although he did find Hill's hanged body and ran away in shock. As Angela and Mike pack their things and try to high-tail it out of town, their cover blown, Gamache tasks Isabelle (and Jean-Guy who shows from the Bistro) with finding them while he himself rushes off to settle this Pierre situation.

Angela and Mike try to escape Three Pines, with a car chase ensuing. However, Angela and Mike lose control of their car and go tumbling off the bridge out of town, capsizing upside down and falling to their doom. The thing is, Jean-Guy was driving but completely over the limit. Isabelle is shocked and decides they should get their story in-check, notably that she was driving and he was riding shotgun.

Gamache shows up at Chowski's cabin but the place is a mess. It looks like some sort of fight has broken out, while Daniel Chowski's badge is still inside. That's important to note because out in the yard, Gamache watches as Pierre burns Kevin's truck and concocts a story that Chowski is completely to blame for all of this. Only, Chowski happens to be inside the burning truck.

The truth is, Pierre was running a scam but makes it out like it was all Chowski. They knew Kevin's truck was full of tobacco and pulled him over, threatening to take them in unless they gave a cut of the profits. Blue filmed them, talking about sovereign rights, while Tommy jumped in the way of Chowski, who shot him. Pierre panicked when Blue ran and ended up shooting her.

With the video on her phone, it would have ruined him. And finally, the piece de resistance sees Pierre get his gun and shoot Gamache in cold blood. When Jean-Guy and Isabelle show up, they find Gamache lying on his back and struggling to remain conscious. As for Pierre, he's gone.
